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1 AN ACT concerning county boards of social services and 2 supplementing Title 44 of the Revised Statutes. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. As used in this act: 8 "Commissioner" means Commissioner of Human Services. 9 "Department" means Department of Human Services. 10 "SNAP" means the New Jersey Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, established pursuant to the federal "Food and 11 12 Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.110-246 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.). 13 14 2. a. The Department of Human Services, to the maximum extent 15 permissible under federal law, shall establish a training program for each employee of a county board of social services who assists 16 17 individuals with SNAP enrollment and recertification processes. The purpose of the training shall be to educate employees on current 18 federal laws, regulations, and standards concerning SNAP, and 19 20 standard best practices to comply with federal SNAP requirements. 21 The department shall review the training program and curriculum at 22 least once every six months and shall require modification of the 23 training program from time to time, as need may require, to 24 incorporate any changes to the federal laws, regulations, and standards 25 concerning SNAP. 26 b. Participation in the training program established pursuant to this section shall be mandatory for all employees of a county board of 27 social services who assist individuals with SNAP enrollment and 28 29 recertification processes. ¹[The chief administrative office of each] Each¹ county board of social services shall be responsible for ensuring 30 that all required employees complete the training program, at least 31 32 once in each calendar year. 33 34 3. The Department of Human Services shall publish county-35 level case tracking data for SNAP on its Internet website that 36 includes, but is not limited to: application approval rates, reasons 37 for application denial, and average application approval time. 38 39 4. a. The Department of Human Services, to the maximum extent 40 permissible under federal law, shall establish a one-year pilot program that ¹<u>shall</u>¹ conduct focused outreach efforts about SNAP benefits and 41 ¹[provides] <u>shall provide</u>¹ application assistance to certain 42 populations. The purpose of this pilot program shall be to increase 43 44 enrollment ${}^{1}[,]^{1}$ among certain underserved populations ${}^{1}[,]^{1}$ of

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eligible participants in SNAP, which underserved populations include, 1 2 but are not limited to, college students, immigrants, and older adults. b. The ¹[application assistance for older adults;]¹ commissioner 3 4 shall select one county board of social services in each of the northern, central, and southern regions of the State to participate in the pilot 5 6 program. 7 c. The pilot program may include, but shall not be limited to, the 8 following elements: 9 (1) the creation and dissemination of videos to educate older adults 10 about SNAP and the application process; (2) grassroots outreach about SNAP through senior centers, 11 hospitals, doctor's offices, houses of worship, and other ¹[place] 12 places¹ where older adults may congregate; 13 (3) the provision of ¹<u>application assistance by</u>¹ telephone ¹<u>for</u> 14 older adults;1 15 16 (4) the development of a social media campaign for college 17 students that raises awareness about SNAP; 18 (5) the formation of partnerships with institutions of higher 19 education and the higher education community, such as school 20 administrators, professors, counselors, student health offices, campus food pantries, and financial aid officers, to raise awareness about 21 SNAP among students and 1 to 1 provide students with the necessary 22 23 information to apply for SNAP; 24 (6) the establishment of campus representatives at institutions of 25 higher learning who can educate students about SNAP and refer 26 students to a local county board of social services; (7) the promotion of SNAP outreach and application materials in 27 28 different languages through organizations and faith-based communities 29 that serve immigrants; and 30 (8) outreach through social and traditional media, especially non-31 English media, to reach immigrant populations. 32 d. At the conclusion of the pilot program, the commissioner shall 33 submit a report to the Governor, and to the Legislature pursuant to 34 section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), on the implementation, 35 outcomes, and effectiveness of the pilot program. The report shall 36 include the commissioner's recommendation on the advisability of the 37 program's continuation and expansion to additional county boards of 38 social services in the State. 39 5. The Commissioner of Human Services shall: 40 $[(a)] \underline{a}^{1}$ apply to the Food and Nutrition Service within the 41 United States Department of Agriculture for any necessary waivers or 42 43 approvals to implement the provisions of this act; and ¹[(b)] b.¹ adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the 44 "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.140 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), 45 46 as may be necessary to effectuate the provisions of this act. 47 48 6. This act shall take effect immediately.
