Concerns SNAP services provided at county boards of social services; appropriates \$250,000.

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AN ACT concerning county boards of social services ²[and],² 1 supplementing Title 44 of the Revised Statutes², and making an 2 3 appropriation². 4 5 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 6 of New Jersey: 7 8 1. As used in this act: 9 "Commissioner" means Commissioner of Human Services. "Department" means Department of Human Services. 10 "SNAP" means the New Jersey Supplemental Nutrition 11 Assistance Program, established pursuant to the federal "Food and 12 Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.110-246 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.). 13 14 15 2. a. The Department of Human Services, to the maximum extent permissible under federal law, shall establish a training 16 program for ²[each employee of a]² county ²[board] boards² of 17 social services ²[who assists] <u>that assist</u>² individuals with SNAP 18 enrollment and recertification processes. The purpose of the 19 training shall be to educate employees on current federal laws, 20 regulations, and standards concerning SNAP, and standard best 21 practices to comply with federal SNAP requirements. 22 The 23 department shall review the training program and curriculum ²[at least once every six months] each year² and ²[shall require 24 modification of] may modify² the training program from time to 25 26 time, as need may require, to incorporate any changes to the federal 27 laws, regulations, and standards concerning SNAP. 28 b. Participation in the training program established pursuant to 29 this section shall be mandatory for all employees of a county board 30 of social services who assist individuals with SNAP enrollment and recertification processes. ¹[The chief administrative office of each] 31 Each¹ county board of social services shall be responsible for 32 ensuring that all required employees complete the training program, 33 34 at least once in each calendar year. 35 36 3. The Department of Human Services shall publish countylevel case tracking data for SNAP on its Internet website that 37 38 includes, but is not limited to: application approval rates, reasons 39 for application denial, and average application approval time. 40 41 ²[4. a. The Department of Human Services, to the maximum extent permissible under federal law, shall establish a one-year pilot 42 program that ¹shall¹ conduct focused outreach efforts about SNAP 43 benefits and ¹[provides] shall provide¹ application assistance to 44

The purpose of this pilot program shall be to 1 2 increase enrollment ¹[,]¹ among certain underserved populations 3 ¹[,]¹ of eligible participants in SNAP, which underserved populations 4 include, but are not limited to, college students, immigrants, and older 5 adults. b. The ¹[application assistance for older adults;]¹ commissioner 6 shall select one county board of social services in each of the northern, 7 8 central, and southern regions of the State to participate in the pilot 9 program. c. The pilot program may include, but shall not be limited to, the 10 11 following elements: 12 (1) the creation and dissemination of videos to educate older adults 13 about SNAP and the application process; 14 (2) grassroots outreach about SNAP through senior centers, 15 hospitals, doctor's offices, houses of worship, and other ¹[place] places¹ where older adults may congregate; 16 (3) the provision of $^{1}application$ assistance by 1 telephone ^{1}for 17 older adults;¹ 18 19 (4) the development of a social media campaign for college 20 students that raises awareness about SNAP; 21 (5) the formation of partnerships with institutions of higher education and the higher education community, such as school 22 23 administrators, professors, counselors, student health offices, campus 24 food pantries, and financial aid officers, to raise awareness about SNAP among students and $1 to^1$ provide students with the necessary 25 information to apply for SNAP; 26 27 (6) the establishment of campus representatives at institutions of 28 higher learning who can educate students about SNAP and refer 29 students to a local county board of social services; 30 (7) the promotion of SNAP outreach and application materials in 31 different languages through organizations and faith-based communities 32 that serve immigrants; and 33 (8) outreach through social and traditional media, especially non-34 English media, to reach immigrant populations. 35 d. At the conclusion of the pilot program, the commissioner shall submit a report to the Governor, and to the Legislature pursuant to 36 37 section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), on the implementation, outcomes, and effectiveness of the pilot program. The report shall 38 39 include the commissioner's recommendation on the advisability of the 40 program's continuation and expansion to additional county boards of social services in the State.]² 41 42 ²[5.] 4. a.² The Commissioner of Human Services shall ²[: 43 $[(a)] \underline{a}^{1}$ apply to the Food and Nutrition Service within the 44 United States Department of Agriculture for any necessary waivers 45 or approvals to implement the provisions of this act 2 [; and] 2 46 ¹[(b)] <u>b.¹ ²The commissioner may</u>² adopt rules and regulations 47 ²[, pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.140 48

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(C.52:14B-1 et seq.), \mathbf{J}^2 as may be necessary to effectuate the 1 provisions of this act ², which rules and regulations shall be 2 effective immediately upon filing with the Office of Administrative 3 Law for a period not to exceed 18 months, and may, thereafter, be 4 5 amended, adopted, or readopted in accordance with the provisions of the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-6 7 <u>1 et seq.)².</u> 8 ²5. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 9 Department of Human Services the sum of \$250,000 for the 10 purposes of effectuating the provisions of this act.² 11 12 6. This act shall take effect immediately. 13
