Creates Code Red alert to shelter at-risk individuals during hot weather.

AN ACT concerning Code Red alert plans to shelter at-risk

individuals and amending P.L.2017, c.68, P.L.2017, c.70, and

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P.L.1942, c.251.

5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 6 of New Jersey: 7 8 1. Section 2 of P.L.2017, c.68 (C.App.A:9-43.19) is amended 9 to read as follows: 10 2. A county governing body, through its office of emergency 11 management or other appropriate office, agency, or department, 12 shall establish a plan for issuing a Code Blue or Code Red alert to 13 municipalities, social service agencies, and non-profit organizations 14 that provide services to at-risk individuals and are located within 15 the county's borders. The county office of emergency management, 16 or appropriate office, agency, or department, shall coordinate with 17 municipal emergency management coordinators in municipalities 18 with a documented homeless population of at least 10, as noted in 19 the most recent Annual Point In Time Count, in developing 20 consistent Code Blue or Code Red alert plans throughout the county 21 that provide for <u>communication and outreach</u>, emergency warming 22 or cooling centers, and transportation during implementation of a 23 Code Blue or Code Red alert plan. This plan may be carried out by 24 designated volunteer organizations. Volunteer-organized Code 25 Blue and Code Red efforts shall receive cooperation and logistical 26 support from the coordinator, but shall operate autonomously, 27 provided that they operate in response to an alert and pursuant to 28 the Code Blue or Code Red alert plan. 29 (cf: P.L.2017, c.68, s.2) 30 31 2. Section 3 of P.L.2017, c.68 (C.App.A:9-43.20) is amended 32 to read as follows: [A coordinator shall declare a Code Blue alert after] After 33 3. 34 evaluating weather forecasts and advisories produced by the National Weather Service that predict the following weather 35 conditions in the county within 24 to 48 hours, a coordinator shall 36 37 declare: 38 a. a Code Blue alert if: 39 (1) temperatures will reach 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower; or 40 [b.] (2) the National Weather Service wind chill temperature

41 will be zero degrees Fahrenheit or less for a period of two hours or
42 more[.]; or

- 43 <u>b.</u> a Code Red alert if:
- 44 (1) the heat index is forecast to reach 95 degrees Fahrenheit to
- 45 <u>99 degrees Fahrenheit for at least two consecutive days; or</u>

Section 5 of P.L.2017, c.70 (C.App.A:9-43.21) is amended 6 as follows: 7 5. The coordinator, or the coordinator's designee, shall review 8 weather forecasts from the National Weather Service on a regular 9 and consistent basis to determine when a Code Blue or Code Red 10 alert is warranted. (cf: P.L.2017, c.70, s.5) 11 12 13 4. Section 20 of P.L.1942, c.251 (C.App.A:9-52) is amended to 14 read as follows: 15 20. Neither the State nor any political subdivision of the State 16 under any circumstances, nor the agents, officers, employees, 17 servants or representatives of the State or any political subdivision 18 thereof, including all volunteers, in good faith carrying out, 19 complying with, or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or 20 regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this act or 21 performing any authorized service in connection therewith, shall be 22 liable for any injury or death to persons or damage to property as 23 the result of [any such] the activity. No person owning, possessing 24 or managing any real property which has been designated, pursuant 25 to the provisions of this act or of any order, rule or regulation 26 promulgated thereunder, as a shelter from destructive operations or 27 attacks by enemies of the United States, shall be liable in any civil 28 action for death or injury to any person who, because [such] the 29 real property has been designated a shelter [as aforesaid], enters 30 upon it solely for the purpose of seeking refuge therein during such 31 destructive operations or attacks or during civil defense tests 32 ordered by lawful authority, except where [such] the death or 33 injury is caused by the willful act of [such] the owner, possessor or 34 manager, or his agents or employees. The foregoing shall not affect 35 the right of any person to receive benefits or compensation which 36 may be specifically provided by the provisions of this or any other 37 State or Federal Statute, nor shall it affect the right of any person to 38 recover under the terms of any policy of insurance. The provisions 39 of this section shall apply but shall not be limited to establishing or 40 developing a Code Blue or Code Red alert plan, or implementing, 41 carrying out, or providing services under a Code Blue or Code Red 42 alert plan, pursuant to the provisions of P.L.2017, c.68 (C.App.A:9-43 43.18 et al.). 44 (cf: P.L.2017, c.68, s.4) 45 46 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

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STATEMENT

3 This bill creates a Code Red alert modeled on the Code Blue4 alert under current law.

5 The bill provides for the coordination, by a county office of 6 emergency management, of emergency services rendered by 7 municipal governments, social service agencies, and certain non-8 profit organizations to the homeless during harsh hot weather 9 conditions. The bill defines an at-risk individual as an individual 10 living outdoors or in poorly insulated settings who is at risk for 11 weather-related exposure and possible death.

The bill amends current law to ensure the plans throughout the county include communication and outreach to at-risk individuals, as well as transportation during the implementation of a Code Blue or Code Red alert plan.

16 The bill requires a county office of emergency management, or 17 other appropriate county office, agency, or department, to 18 coordinate with municipal emergency management coordinators in 19 municipalities with a documented homeless population of at least 20 10 persons, to develop consistent Code Red alert plans throughout 21 the county that provide emergency cooling centers during 22 implementation of a Code Red alert.

The bill makes the county emergency management coordinator
responsible for monitoring National Weather Service weather
forecasts, and requires issuance of a Code Red alert if:

1) the heat index is forecast to reach 95 degrees Fahrenheit to99 degrees Fahrenheit for at least two consecutive days; or

28 2) the temperatures will reach 100 degrees Fahrenheit to 10429 degrees Fahrenheit for any length of time.

The issuance of an alert will trigger implementation of the county Code Red alert plan, including the provision of emergency cooling centers for at-risk individuals. These cooling centers may be provided by designated volunteer organizations that would receive planning support from the county but operate autonomously in response to an alert.

The bill provides "Good Samaritan" protection from civil liability to the State, a political subdivision, and their agents and employees, as well as to volunteer organizations and their members and volunteers who, during implementation of a Code Red alert plan, provide emergency cooling centers to at-risk individuals.

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
