Creates Code Red alert pilot program to shelter at-risk individuals during hot weather.

AN ACT concerning Code Red alert plans to shelter at-risk
 individuals during certain pilot period and amending P.L.1942,
 c.251.

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5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
6 of New Jersey:

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8 1. (New section) As used in P.L., c. (pending before the9 Legislature as this bill):

"At-risk individual" means an individual living outdoors, on the
streets, in the parks, or in poorly insulated settings, and who is at
risk for weather-related exposure and possible death.

"Coordinator" means the county emergency management
coordinator appointed pursuant to section 12 of P.L.1953, c.438
(C.App.A:9-42.1).

"County governing body" means the board of county
commissioners, or in the case of those counties organized pursuant
to the provisions of the "Optional County Charter Law," P.L.1972,
c.154 (C.40:41A-1 et seq.), the board of county commissioners and
the county executive, the county supervisor, or the county manager,
as appropriate.

"Pilot program" means the three-year pilot program established
pursuant to section 2 of P.L., c. (pending before the Legislature
as this bill).

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26 2. (New section) a. A county governing body, through its 27 office of emergency management or other appropriate office, 28 agency, or department, shall establish a pilot program in the form of 29 a three-year plan for issuing a Code Red alert to municipalities, 30 social service agencies, and non-profit organizations that provide 31 services to at-risk individuals and are located within the county's 32 The county office of emergency management, or borders. 33 appropriate office, agency, or department, shall coordinate with 34 municipal emergency management coordinators in municipalities with a documented homeless population of at least 10 people, as 35 36 noted in the most recent Annual Point In Time Count, in developing 37 consistent Code Red alert plans throughout the county that provide 38 for communication and outreach, emergency warming or cooling 39 centers, and transportation during implementation of a Code Red 40 alert plan. This plan may be carried out by designated volunteer organizations. Volunteer-organized Code Red efforts shall receive 41 42 cooperation and logistical support from the coordinator, but shall 43 operate autonomously, provided that the volunteer organizations

3 b. On or before the first day of the 30th month next following 4 the effective date of P.L., c. (pending before the Legislature as 5 this bill), the State Office of Emergency Management shall submit a 6 report to the Governor and, pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), to the Legislature. 7 The report shall provide 8 information on the success of the pilot program, challenges faced by 9 the program, and recommendations on whether or not to make the 10 pilot program permanent. The State Office of Emergency Management may request information needed for development and 11 12 compilation of this report from each appropriate county office. 13 Following the conclusion of the pilot program, a county governing 14 body may certify and submit a request for a reimbursement for the 15 administrative costs of the pilot program to the State Office of 16 Emergency Management, and the State Office of Emergency 17 Management shall reimburse the county for those certified costs. 18 3. (New section) A 1 <u>county</u>¹ coordinator shall declare a Code 19 20 Red alert during the time of the three-year pilot program ¹[, if, after evaluating weather forecasts and advisories produced by <u>when</u>¹ the 21 22 National Weather Service ¹**[**: 23 (1) the heat index is forecast to reach a daily high temperature of 24 95 degrees Fahrenheit to 99 degrees Fahrenheit for at least two 25 consecutive days; or 26 (2) the daily high temperature is forecast to reach a high of at least 100 degrees Fahrenheit for any length of time.] office for that 27 county's region declares a heat advisory for the area.¹ 28 29 30 ¹[4. The coordinator, or the coordinator's (New section) 31 designee, shall review weather forecasts from the National Weather 32 Service on a regular and consistent basis during the time of the 33 three-year pilot program to determine when a Code Red alert is 34 warranted.]¹ 35 36 ¹[5.] 4.¹ Section 20 of P.L.1942, c.251 (C.App.A:9-52) is 37 amended to read as follows: 20. Neither the State nor any political subdivision of the State 38 39 under any circumstances, nor the agents, officers, employees, 40 servants or representatives of the State or any political subdivision 41 thereof, including all volunteers, in good faith carrying out, 42 complying with, or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or 43 regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of [this act] 44 P.L.1942, c.251 (C.App. A:9-33 et seq.) or performing any 45 authorized service in connection therewith, shall be liable for any 46

46 injury or death to persons or damage to property as the result of47 [any such] the activity. No person owning, possessing or

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managing any real property which has been designated, pursuant to 1 2 the provisions of [this act] P.L.1942, c.251 (C.App. A:9-33 et seq.) 3 or of any order, rule or regulation promulgated thereunder, as a 4 shelter from destructive operations or attacks by enemies of the 5 United States, shall be liable in any civil action for death or injury 6 to any person who, because [such] the real property has been 7 designated a shelter [as aforesaid], enters upon it solely for the 8 purpose of seeking refuge therein during such destructive 9 operations or attacks or during civil defense tests ordered by lawful authority, except where [such] the death or injury is caused by the 10 willful act of [such] the owner, possessor or manager, or his agents 11 12 or employees. The foregoing shall not affect the right of any person 13 to receive benefits or compensation which may be specifically 14 provided by the provisions of this or any other State or Federal 15 Statute, nor shall it affect the right of any person to recover under 16 the terms of any policy of insurance. The provisions of this section 17 shall apply but shall not be limited to establishing or developing a 18 Code Blue alert plan, or a Code Red alert plan pursuant to P.L. 19 c. (pending before the Legislature as this bill), or implementing, 20 carrying out, or providing services under a Code Blue alert plan, 21 pursuant to the provisions of P.L.2017, c.68 (C.App.A:9-43.18 et 22 al.), or a Code Red alert plan pursuant to the provisions of 23 P.L., c.
