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#### **SYNOPSIS**

Requires certain documentation of needs of students with disabilities during school security drills and emergency situations and in school security plans; requires staff training on needs of students with disabilities in emergency planning.

#### **CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT**

AN ACT concerning emergency planning in schools, amending N.J.S.18A:41-1 and P.L.2009, c.178, and supplementing chapters 41 and 46 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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#### 1. N.J.S.18A:41-1 is amended to read as follows:

9 18A:41-1. Every principal of a school of two or more rooms, or 10 of a school of one room, when located above the first story of a building, shall have at least one fire drill and one school security 11 12 drill each month within the school hours, including any summer months during which the school is open for instructional programs 13 14 <sup>2</sup>[, and shall require all teachers of all schools] . Employees of the school district or receiving school<sup>2</sup>, whether occupying buildings of 15 one or more stories, <sup>2</sup>[to] shall<sup>2</sup> keep all <sup>2</sup>exterior<sup>2</sup> doors and exits 16 <sup>2</sup>[of their respective rooms and buildings unlocked during the 17 18 school hours, except locked at all times except when necessary to 19 comply with the requirements set forth in the Uniform Fire Code, including applicable requirements<sup>2</sup> during an emergency lockdown 20 or an emergency lockdown drill. All students <sup>2</sup>and staff<sup>2</sup> shall fully 21 participate in each drill conducted <sup>2</sup>to the greatest extent practicable 22 and, when appropriate, utilize procedures for assisting in the rescue 23 24 of persons unable to use the general means of egress to ensure that participation does not pose a safety risk<sup>2</sup>. Where school buildings 25 have been provided with fire escapes, they shall be used by a part or 26 27 all of the pupils performing every fire drill. <sup>2</sup>[An actual fire or school security emergency that occurs at a school during the month 28 29 and that includes activities which are the equivalent of a drill shall 30 be considered a drill for the purposes of meeting the requirements of this section. **]**<sup>2</sup> 31

A law enforcement officer shall be present at a minimum of one school security drill in each school year in order to make recommendations on any improvements or changes to school security drill procedures that the officer may deem advisable.

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1 prepared pursuant to section 3 of P.L.2009, c.178 (C.App.A:9-86) 2 and shall utilize various formats such as drills, functional exercises, 3 and tabletop exercises. The annual training provided to employees 4 shall be conducted collaboratively by the district or nonpublic 5 school and emergency responders, including law enforcement, fire, 6 and emergency medical services personnel, in order to identify 7 weaknesses in school safety and security policies and procedures 8 and to increase the effectiveness of emergency responders. The 9 training shall incorporate information on the unique needs of 10 students with disabilities. Employees shall be made aware of any anticipated mobility, sensory, medical, social, communication, 11 12 emotional, regulatory, and decision-making support needs of 13 students and any supports, modifications, accommodations, and 14 services to be provided to students, as enumerated in their 15 individualized education programs, individualized health care plans, 16 504 plans, or service plans pursuant to section 4 of P.L. , c. A local board of education <sup>2</sup>, chief school administrator of a 6 receiving school,<sup>2</sup> and chief school administrator of a nonpublic 7 school shall provide <sup>2</sup>, to the extent permitted by federal law, <sup>2</sup> to all 8 persons who supervise youth programs that are not sponsored by the 9 school district <sup>2</sup>, receiving school, <sup>2</sup> or nonpublic school, but operate 10 a program in a district <sup>2</sup>, receiving school, <sup>2</sup> or nonpublic school 11 building before or after school hours, on the weekend, or during a 12 13 period when school is not in session, information on school district <sup>2</sup>, receiving school, <sup>2</sup> or nonpublic school practices and procedures 14 in the event of a school safety or security incident at a school 15 including non-confidential information on evacuation procedures, 16 17 emergency response protocols, and emergency contact information. 18 <sup>2</sup>The information provided to persons who supervise youth 19 programs pursuant to the provisions of this subsection shall not include student records.<sup>2</sup> It shall be the responsibility of the 20 organization that sponsors the youth program to train the program's 21 22 employees and volunteers on the school security and emergency 23 procedures in effect in the school building in which the youth 24 program is located. An employee subject to the provisions of subsections a. or b. of this section shall be made aware of any anticipated mobility, sensory, medical, social, communication, emotional, regulatory, and decision-making support needs of students in the care of the employee and any supports, modifications, accommodations, and services to be provided to students, as enumerated in their individualized education programs, individualized health care plans, 504 plans, or service plans pursuant to section 4 of P.L., c. (C. ) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

<sup>2</sup>[individualized education program, individualized health care plan, 504 plan, or service plan documentation maintained in the student record<sup>2</sup> shall indicate whether or not the student is able to safely and fully participate in fire <sup>1</sup>drills<sup>1</sup> or school security drills without the use of supplementary supports, modifications, accommodations, or services 2, or if any accommodations are needed, including determining areas of refuge during an emergency<sup>2</sup>. 

- b. If it is determined that a student requires supplementary supports, modifications, accommodations, or services in order to safely and fully participate in a fire <sup>1</sup>drill<sup>1</sup> or school security drill, a written plan shall be <sup>2</sup>[included in the student's individualized education program, individualized health care plan, 504 plan, or service plan] maintained in the student record<sup>2</sup>. The written plan shall:
- (1) describe the anticipated mobility, sensory, medical, social, communication, emotional, regulatory, and decision-making support needs of the student during a fire <sup>1</sup>drill <sup>1</sup> or school security drill and during an actual emergency situation;
- (2) describe the supports, modifications, accommodations, and services to be provided to the student during a fire <sup>1</sup>drill <sup>1</sup> or school security drill and during an actual emergency situation; and
- (3) describe the role of school employees in supporting the student during a fire <sup>1</sup>drill <sup>1</sup> or school security drill and during an actual emergency situation, including the need for any specific training of school employees.
- c. A school district and, if applicable, a nonpublic school shall on a regular basis, but not less than once annually, perform a review of any determinations made pursuant to this section to evaluate the school security needs of a student.
- 5. (New section) In developing its districtwide school safety and security plan, a school district <sup>2</sup> and receiving school<sup>2</sup> shall:
- a. demonstrate that it has considered the individual needs of each student with a disability, as enumerated in the students' individualized education programs, individualized health care plans, 504 plans, or, in the case of students with disabilities enrolled in nonpublic schools, service plans pursuant to section 4 of P.L. ,

- b. incorporate <sup>2</sup>protocols into districtwide school safety and security plan for communicating<sup>2</sup> the individual needs of each student with a disability <sup>2</sup>[into the districtwide school safety and security plan and, as deemed appropriate and necessary, communicate those needs], when appropriate and in compliance with the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974," (20 U.S.C. s. 1232g), <sup>2</sup> to third parties including, but not limited to,
