SYNOPSIS

Permits behavioral and mental health care providers to operate within homeless shelters.

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AN ACT concerning homeless shelters and behavioral and mental 1 2 health and supplementing Title 26 of the Revised Statutes. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. a. As used in this section: "Behavioral health care" means procedures or services, other 8 9 than primary health care services, which are provided by a health 10 care practitioner to a patient for the treatment of a mental illness, emotional disorder, or drug or alcohol use disorder ¹[that is of mild 11 to moderate severity. "Behavioral health care" shall not include 12 13 procedures or services that are provided for the treatment of severe 14 mental illness, severe emotional disorder, or severe drug or alcohol 15 use disorder **]**¹. 16 "Behavioral health care provider" means ¹[a provider licensed or approved by the Department of Human Services to render 17 behavioral health care services <u>a psychiatrist</u>, psychiatric 18 19 ²[advance] advanced² practice nurse, psychologist, clinical social worker, marriage and family therapist, ²[or]² any other mental 20 21 health or substance use disorder treatment provider licensed pursuant to Title 45 of the Revised Statutes¹², a practitioner 22 otherwise authorized to provide behavioral health care in the State, 23 24 or a treatment provider who is licensed or otherwise authorized to 25 provide behavioral health care in the State acting in the provider's 26 capacity as an employee or contractor for a facility licensed by the Department of Health to provide behavioral health care². 27 28 "Emergency shelter for the homeless" means a building or 29 structure in which a public entity or a private, nonprofit 30 organization provides shelter, or food and shelter, to individuals and 31 families having neither a home nor the means to obtain a home or 32 other temporary lodging. 33 ¹["Mental health care professional" means a psychiatrist, 34 psychologist, or clinical social worker licensed pursuant to Title 45 of the Revised Statutes.]¹ 35 b. A behavioral health care provider ¹[and a mental health care 36 professional]¹ shall be authorized to ¹[jointly or separately]¹ 37 provide behavioral ¹[or mental]¹ health care services to homeless 38 39 persons within an emergency shelter for the homeless, ²[in a manner to be determined by the Commissioners of Community 40 41 Affairs and Human Services, the State Board of Medical Examiners, 42 the State Board of Psychological Examiners, and the State Board of 43 Social Work Examiners] on the condition that:

1 (1) the services are made available to all residents to whom such 2 services are applicable; 3 (2) the services are provided in an environment that ensures, to the extent feasible given the layout and structure of the shelter, 4 5 ongoing visual and auditory privacy for individual or group 6 counseling services; 7 (3) in the case of residents not receiving behavioral health care 8 and to the extent feasible given the layout and structure of the 9 shelter, the privacy and the right not to be disturbed of such 10 residents are protected; and 11 (4) participation in any behavioral health care program is not made mandatory for any person residing within the shelter². 12 A behavioral health care provider ¹[or mental health care 13 professional ¹ may provide the services authorized pursuant to this 14 15 section in response to emergencies, on a part-time or full-time basis, 16 and within a temporary or permanent location within the emergency 17 shelter for the homeless that is exclusively used by the behavioral health care provider ¹[or mental health care professional]¹²[to 18 provide such services within the shelter]. The shelter shall set forth 19 a schedule designating the days and hours that the services may be 20 21 provided. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the 22 provision of behavioral health care, if necessary, on an emergency 23 basis outside the designated days and hours. 24 c. The Commissioner of Human Services shall apply for such 25 State plan amendments or waivers to provide behavioral health care, as described in this section, and secure federal financial 26 participation for the associated State Medicaid expenditures under 27 the federal Medicaid program². 28 29 30 2. The ²[Commissioners of Community Affairs and Human 31 Services, the State Board of Medical Examiners, the State Board of 32 Psychological Examiners, and the State Board of Social Work Examiners] Commissioner of Community Affairs, in consultation 33 with the Commissioners of Children and Families, Health, and 34 Human Services, and the Director of the Division of Consumer 35 Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety,² shall jointly 36 37 or separately adopt rules and regulations, in accordance with the 38 "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et 39 seq.), as are necessary to effectuate the provisions of this act. 40

41 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
