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AN ACT concerning the practice of optometry and amending various
 parts of the statutory law.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. R.S.45:12-1 is amended to read as follows:

8 45:12-1 Optometry is hereby declared to be a profession, and the 9 practice of optometry is defined to be the employment of objective 10 or subjective means, or both, for the examination of the human eye and adnexae for the purposes of ascertaining any departure from the 11 12 normal, measuring its powers of vision and adapting lenses [or], 13 prisms, or vision training for the aid thereof [, or the use and 14 prescription of pharmaceutical agents, excluding injections, except 15 for injections to counter anaphylactic reaction, and excluding 16 controlled dangerous substances as provided in sections 5 and 6 of 17 P.L.1970, c.226 (C.24:21-5 and C.24:21-6), except as otherwise 18 authorized by section 9 of P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-9.11), ] and the 19 administration and performance of any diagnostic or therapeutic modality reasonable for the purposes of diagnosing and treating 20 21 deficiencies, deformities, diseases, or abnormalities of the human 22 eye and adnexae, including [the removal of superficial foreign 23 bodies from the eye and adnexae. The practice of optometry shall 24 include the administration of immunizations against coronaviruses 25 and influenza by any route or modality, provided that 26 administration of the immunization with is consistent recommendations issued 27 by the Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices in the federal Centers for Disease Control 28 29 and Prevention and complies with the requirements of section 2 of 30 P.L.2021, c.101 (C.45:12-1.1)], but not limited to: 31 a. the employment of any means for the measurement of the 32 powers of vision or the adaptation of lenses or prisms for the aid 33 thereof; 34 b. the use of testing appliances for the purposes of 35 measurement of the powers of vision or the diagnosis or any 36 ocuolar deficiency, disease, or deformity, or visual or muscular

c. prescribing of lenses, prisms, eyeglass lenses, prosthetic
eyes, vision therapy, orthotic therapy or ocular exercises for the
correction, relief or rehabilitation of any (1) ocular deficiency or
deformity, (2) visual or muscular anomaly or (3) disease of the
human eye or the process of vision;

43 <u>d. the use and prescription of pharmaceutical agents by any</u>
 44 route of administration including controlled dangerous substances;

1 e. the prescription or administration, or both, of epinephrine or equivalent medication to counteract anaphylaxis or anaphylactic 2 3 reactions; 4 f. the removal of superficial foreign bodies from the eye and 5 adnexae; 6 g. the performance or ordering of procedures and laboratory 7 tests appropriate for the diagnosis of conditions or diseases of the 8 eye, adnexae, and visual system; 9 h. the administration of immunizations against coronaviruses, 10 influenza, and varicella-zoster virus by any route or modality, provided that administration of the immunization is consistent with 11 12 recommendations issued by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices in the United States Centers for Disease 13 14 Control and Prevention. An optometrist shall not administer an immunization against a coronavirus, influenza, or varicella-zoster 15 16 virus pursuant to this section to any patient who is younger than 18 17 years of age. An immunization against a coronaviruses, influenza, 18 and varicella-zoster virus administered to a patient by an 19 optometrist under this section shall be reported by the optometrist to 20 the New Jersey Immunization Information System established 21 pursuant to section 4 of P.L.2004, c.138 (C.26:4-134) for inclusion 22 in the patient's registry; 23 i. simple ophthalmologic procedures including non-invasive 24 application of laser and ultrasound, reasonable and limited to the 25 diagnosis and treatment of conditions or disease of the eye, 26 adnexae, and visual systems, including but not limited to 27 trabeculoplasty, capsulotomy, and iridotomy performed with topical 28 anesthesia, as determined solely by the New Jersey State Board of 29 Optometrists; 30 j. minor procedures including simple ophthalmologic 31 procedures including, but not limited to, treatment of chalazions, excision of skin tags and other lesions without clinical 32 33 characteristics of malignancy, performed with a local anesthesia as 34 determined by the New Jersey State Board of Optometrists, except 35 that these applications and minor procedures shall not include: 36 (1) invasive, intra-ocular surgery, defined as those surgical 37 procedures which require a full thickness incision of the globe of 38 the eye; 39 (2) orbital surgery including strabismus surgery or any surgical 40 procedure which requires an incision of the orbital septum, surgical 41 procedures, or repair of wounds which require suturing in layers; 42 and 43 (3) any surgical procedure performed under general anesthesia 44 or the administration of general anesthesia; and 45 k. provision of pre- and post-operative care of procedures 46 included in paragraphs (1), (2), and (3) of subsection j. of this 47 section.

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An optometrist [utilizing pharmaceutical agents], for the purposes of treatment of ocular conditions and diseases, shall be held to a standard of patient care [in the use of such agents] commensurate to that of a [physician utilizing pharmaceutical agents for treatment purposes] licensee of the State Board of <u>Medical Examiners performing the same procedures</u>.

7 A person shall be deemed to be practicing optometry within the 8 meaning of this chapter who in any way advertises himself as an 9 optometrist, or who shall employ any means for the measurement of 10 the powers of vision or the adaptation of lenses or prisms for the aid 11 thereof, practice, offer or attempt to practice] practices optometry as herein defined, either on his own behalf or as an employee or 12 13 student of another, whether under the personal supervision of his 14 employer or perceptor or not, or to use testing appliances for the 15 purposes of measurement of the powers of vision or diagnose any 16 ocular deficiency or deformity, visual or muscular anomaly of the 17 human eye and adnexae or prescribe lenses, prisms or ocular 18 exercise for the correction or the relief thereof, or who uses or 19 prescribes pharmaceutical agents for the purposes of diagnosing and 20 treating deficiencies, deformities, diseases or abnormalities of the 21 human eye and adnexae or who holds himself out as qualified to 22 practice optometry.

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2. R.S.45:12-8 is amended to read as follows:

26 45:12-8 Every person practicing optometry shall display his 27 registration certificate or certificates, together with his registration 28 renewal certificate or certificates, in a conspicuous place in the 29 office or offices wherein he practices optometry, but not in such 30 manner that they may be seen from the outside of such office or 31 offices, and, whenever required, exhibit the registration and renewal 32 certificates to the board or its authorized representatives. Every 33 office where an optometrist is practicing shall have displayed on a 34 sign so as to be read on the outside of the office the name of each 35 optometrist practicing therein. When practicing the profession of 36 optometry outside of or away from the office he shall deliver to 37 each patient a bill for professional services rendered, which shall 38 contain his full name, [home post-office address and] the address 39 of his principal office in this State, the number of his certificates, 40 and his signature.

Every person practicing optometry in New Jersey shall notify the board in writing of any change of address or location of his office or offices at least 5 days prior to occupying said new office, returning therewith the appropriate registration renewal certificate or certificates and the board shall issue a new registration renewal certificate or certificates for the new office location or locations.

1 3. Section 7 of P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-9.9) is amended to 2 read as follows: 3 7. The New Jersey State Board of Optometrists shall [establish 4 the credentialing requirements which shall be fulfilled before a 5 person may be certified <u>authorize a licensee of the board</u> to use or 6 prescribe pharmaceutical agents or perform simple ophthalmologic 7 procedures and other minor procedures for treatment purposes in 8 the practice of optometry upon submission to the board of evidence 9 of competence to perform the minor procedures requested. 10 Evidence of competence shall include completion of a course of 11 study administered by a school or college of optometry accredited 12 by the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education of the 13 American Optometric Association and by attestation from an 14 optometrist authorized to perform such procedures or an 15 ophthalmologist licensed in New Jersey and certified by the 16 American Board of Ophthalmology who has proctored the licensee 17 under direct supervision to perform such procedures. These 18 educational standards shall be no less than that required of currently-enrolled students as part of the requirements for 19 20 graduation. Licensees shall be immediately authorized at their 21 current level of practice. A licensee currently certified to use and 22 prescribe pharmaceutical agents for treatment purposes pursuant to 23 P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-9.8 et seq.) shall be immediately 24 credentialed and certified to use and prescribe pharmaceutical 25 agents authorized by that act for treatment purposes in the practice 26 of optometry. 27 Prior to authorization by the New Jersey State Board of 28 Optometrists to perform simple ophthalmologic procedures and 29 other minor procedures, as determined by the board, an optometrist 30 who holds an active license to practice optometry in New Jersey 31 shall be permitted to perform simple ophthalmologic procedures 32 and other minor procedures, as determined by the board, only when 33 enrolled in an approved program of training sponsored by a school 34 or college of optometry accredited by the Accreditation Council 35 on Optometric Education of the American Optometric Association, 36 and only when under the direct supervision of a properly authorized 37 optometrist authorized to perform such procedures or an ophthalmologist licensed in New Jersey and certified by the 38 39 American Board of Ophthalmology in order to fulfill the 40 requirements of that training program. Training programs and each 41 licensee registered to participate in a recognized training program 42 shall be registered with the board prior to the commencement of the 43 program or the participation. 44 In addition, the board shall establish continuing education 45 requirements for the renewal of [certification] authorization for the 46 use and prescription of pharmaceutical agents and the performance 47 of simple ophthalmologic procedures and other minor procedures 48 for treatment purposes in the practice of optometry. [No licensee

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1 shall be tested by the board for certification to use or prescribe 2 pharmaceutical agents for treatment purposes in the practice of 3 optometry before having first satisfactorily completed all 4 educational requirements in ocular pharmacology at a school duly 5 accredited by the United States Department of Education and the 6 Council on Postsecondary Accreditation. These educational 7 standards shall be no less than that required of currently enrolled 8 students as part of their requirements for graduation from that 9 This credentialing and certification process shall be school. 10 required of all persons seeking to utilize pharmaceutical agents for 11 treatment purposes in the practice of optometry regardless of 12 licensure either prior or subsequent to the effective date of P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-9.8 et seq.); except that licensees shall be 13 14 immediately certified at their current level of practice and those 15 licensees currently certified to use and prescribe pharmaceutical 16 agents for treatment purposes pursuant to P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-17 9.8 et seq.) shall be immediately credentialed and certified to use 18 and prescribe those pharmaceutical agents authorized by that act for 19 treatment purposes in the practice of optometry but not orally until 20 certified, except for injections to counter anaphylactic reactions.

21 The board shall maintain a list of all approved [credentialing] 22 courses, which list shall be made available upon request to licensees 23 or other interested persons. Upon receipt of verification of 24 satisfactory completion of an approved [credentialing] course of 25 study, the board shall [certify] <u>authorize</u> the optometrist applicant 26 [as certified] in the use and prescription of those pharmaceutical 27 agents and the performance of simple ophthalmologic procedures 28 and other minor procedures.

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31 4. Section 9 of P.L.1991, c.385 (C.45:12-9.11) is amended to 32 read as follows:

9. a. Whenever in any law there is a requirement or duty with 33 34 respect to the prescription, administration or dispensing of any drug 35 which applies to any person authorized to prescribe that drug, the 36 same shall apply to an optometrist when prescribing, administering 37 or dispensing a pharmaceutical agent pursuant to R.S.45:12-1, 38 except that an optometrist shall not dispense a prescription as 39 provided for in R.S.45:12-1 in an amount exceeding a 72-hour 40 supply of that prescription unless the prescription is dispensed at no 41 charge to the patient. [Subject to the provisions of P.L.1991, c.385] 42 (C.45:12-9.8 et seq.), an optometrist authorized to prescribe, 43 administer, or dispense a pharmaceutical agent shall be permitted to 44 prescribe, administer, and dispense for the purpose of diagnosing 45 and treating deficiencies, deformities, diseases, or abnormalities of the human eye and adnexae pharmaceutical agents classified as 46 47 Schedule III, IV, and V controlled dangerous substances and,

regardless of schedule, pharmaceutical agents containing
 hydrocodone.]

b. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection a. of this
section, an optometrist may dispense a pharmaceutical agent, as
provided for in R.S.45:12-1, that is delivered to the eye through a
contact lens or other medical device or through any other route of
administration approved by the board and may dispense such
pharmaceutical agent at a charge to the patient.

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11 5. Section 10 of P.L.2004, c.115 (C.45:12-9.13) is amended to 12 read as follows:

13 10. No licensee shall be certified by the New Jersey State Board 14 of Optometrists to use or prescribe pharmaceutical agents in the 15 practice of optometry before having completed credentialing 16 requirements in ocular pharmacology approved and administered by 17 the New Jersey State Board of Optometrists. [Until such time as a 18 majority of the optometrist members of the New Jersey State Board 19 of Optometrists are certified to use and prescribe pharmaceutical 20 agents for treatment purposes in the practice of optometry, an 21 interim four-member panel of experts in ocular pharmacology shall 22 be established to prepare or endorse credentialing requirements for 23 board approval. The interim advisory panel of experts in ocular 24 pharmacology shall be comprised of a physician selected by the 25 State Board of Medical Examiners, a member selected by the Board 26 of Pharmacy, a representative of a school of optometry duly 27 accredited by the United States Department of Education and the 28 Council on Postsecondary Accreditation, to be selected by the New 29 Jersey State Board of Optometrists, and the Commissioner of the 30 Department of Health and Senior Services or his designee. The 31 interim panel shall be selected by the respective boards within 90 32 days of the effective date of this amendatory and supplementary act. 33 Panel members shall be directly responsible to the Director of the 34 Division of Consumer Affairs, who may order the replacement of 35 any panel member for failure to promptly and equitably fulfill their 36 duties. The panel shall have 120 days following appointment of a 37 majority of the panel to submit to the New Jersey State Board of 38 Optometrists credentialing requirements in ocular pharmacology. 39 Should the panel fail within the 120 day period to submit 40 credentialing requirements to the New Jersey State Board of 41 Optometrists, the Director of the Division of Consumer Affairs 42 shall designate, within 90 days thereafter, the credentialing 43 requirements for the interim period. Should the Director of the 44 Division of Consumer Affairs fail to designate credentialing 45 requirements within the 90-day period, the credentialing 46 requirements shall be designated by the New Jersey State Board of 47 Optometrists.]

1 6. Section 7 of P.L.1948, c.350 (C.45:12-18.1) is amended to 2 read as follows 3 7. The record of an optometrist of the examination of a patient, including patient's name, address, age, occupation, and all findings 4 5 and pertinent facts concerning the patient discovered and disclosed 6 during the course of such examination, as well as the record of 7 professional services rendered and the fees charged therefor shall, 8 because of the confidential nature in the relationship, be the 9 exclusive property of the [optometrist who] optometric practice 10 that rendered the professional services to the patient. Any unauthorized use by any other person, firm or corporation of the 11 12 information contained therein shall constitute an infringement of the 13 property rights of the patient and the [optometrist] optometric 14 practice, and shall subject the offender to a civil suit for damages by 15 the person aggrieved. 16 (cf: P.L.1948, c. 350, s.7) 17 7. This act shall take effect immediately. 18 19 20 21 **STATEMENT** 22 23 This bill updates the statute governing optometrists licensed in 24 New Jersey by matching the scope of practice, services and 25 treatments optometrists can offer patients with the optometrists' 26 doctoral training, education, and clinical experience. Additionally, 27 the bill clarifies requirements that an optometrist must complete prior to receiving authorization to perform certain services. 28
