4	WHEREAS, Civic engagement is a critical opportunity for a voter to								
5	shape the policies that affect the health challenges facing the voter's								
6	local community; and								
7	WHEREAS, Civic health describes the capacity of a community to								
8	address issues that impact the well-being of community members								
9	through participation in elections and other civic engagement								
10	activities; and								
11	WHEREAS, Civic participation gives a voter the ability to shape the								
12	policies that affect a voter's personal health outcomes; and								
13	WHEREAS, Civic health is recognized as a social determinant of an								
14	individual's health and an individual who votes as a form of civic								
15	participation self-reports better health than an individual who does								
16	not vote; and								
17	WHEREAS, Health outcomes may be determined by non-medical								
18	factors including access to food, transportation, and affordable								
19	housing; and								
20	WHEREAS, Medical professionals have made great strides in								
21	addressing the underlying social conditions that make their patients								
22	sick including hunger, drug addiction, and homelessness; and								
23	WHEREAS, By checking civic vital signs including voter registration								
24	and participation when talking to colleagues and patients,								
25	healthcare providers can promote better civic health; and								
26	WHEREAS, Nonpartisan voter registration in medical settings has been								
27	successful in registering patients to vote and expanding the number								
28	of engaged voters; and								
29	WHEREAS, Empowering community members to register to vote and								
30	participate in elections is a critical action healthcare institutions can								
31	take to improve not only community-level civic health, but also								
32	individual-level physical and mental health; and								
33	WHEREAS, Over 200 hospitals, healthcare associations, and civic								
34	engagement organizations unite to celebrate "Civic Health Month"								
35	each August; and								
36	WHEREAS, Given that civic health strengthens democracy and								
37	improves health outcomes, it is altogether fitting and proper, to								
38	designate August of each year as "Civic Health Month" in New								
39	Jersey; now, therefore,

STATEMENT

This resolution designates the month of August as "Civic Health Month" in New Jersey.

Civic engagement provides a voter the opportunity to shape the policies that affect the health of a voter's local community. Civic health describes the capacity of a community to address issues that impact the well-being of community members by participating in elections and other civic engagement.

Health outcomes may be determined by non-medical factors, often called social determinants of health, such as access to food, transportation, and affordable housing. Civic health is also recognized as a social determinant of an individual's health. Medical professionals have made great strides in addressing many social determinants of health that affect a patient's health including hunger, drug addiction, and homelessness.

Empowering community members to register to vote and participate in elections improves community-level civic health and individual-level physical and mental health. Over 200 hospitals, healthcare associations, and civic engagement organizations celebrate "Civic Health Month" each August. Therefore, it is altogether and fitting and proper, to designate August of each year as "Civic Health Month" in New Jersey.
