Requires DHS to establish public awareness campaign about period poverty.

#### **CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT**

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AN ACT establishing a period poverty public awareness campaign

and supplementing Title 26 of the Revised Statutes.

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4	BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
5	of New Jersey:
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7	1. a. The Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation
8	with the Commissioner of Health, shall establish a public awareness
9	campaign to publicize and inform the general public about period
10	poverty and its economic and public health implications. The
11	campaign shall include information on, at a minimum:
12	(1) the definition of period poverty;
13	(2) the causes of period poverty;
14	(3) the number of persons in the State of New Jersey and in the
15	United States who are affected by period poverty; and
16	(4) what can be done to address the issue of period poverty
17	Statewide.
18	b. The commissioner shall, at a minimum:
19	(1) provide for the development of printed educational materials
20	and public service announcements in languages including, but not
21	limited to, English and Spanish; and
22	(2) disseminate information for distribution to the public on the
23	Departments of Human Services and Health official websites and
24	through a variety of entities, including, but not limited to, local
25	health agencies and clinics, physicians, health care facilities, county
26	human services offices, pharmacies, libraries, and other community-
27	based outreach programs and organizations.
28	c. The commissioner shall report to the Governor, and to the
29	Legislature pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1),
30	no later than 24 months after the effective date of this act, and
31	annually thereafter, on the activities and accomplishments of the

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34	2. This act shall take effect immediately, except that the
35	commissioner may take any administrative action in advance as

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39	STATEMENT
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41	This bill directs the Commissioner of Human Services, in
42	consultation with the Commissioner of Health, to establish a public
43	awareness campaign to publicize and inform the general public
44	about period poverty and its economic and public health
45	implications. The campaign is to include information on: (1) the
46	definition of period poverty; (2) the causes of period poverty; (3)

the number of persons in the State of New Jersey and in the United

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States who are affected by period poverty; and (4) what can be done to address the issue of period poverty Statewide.

Under the provisions of the bill, the commissioner is to develop educational materials and public service announcements in languages including, but not limited to, English and Spanish and to disseminate information for distribution to the public on the Departments of Human Services and Health official websites and through a variety of entities and community-based programs and organizations.

The bill also directs the commissioner to annually report to the Governor, and to the Legislature, no later than two years after the effective date of the bill, and annually thereafter, on the activities and accomplishments of the public awareness campaign.

Period poverty refers to the social, economic, political, and cultural barriers to menstrual products, education, and sanitation. Although period poverty is a widespread problem, there is a lack of research on the topic. It is the sponsor's intent to promote awareness of, and public actions to address, period poverty.
